- 1) Welcome and Introductions Ted Wimpey, VAHC Chair
- 2) Speaker's Perspective and Outlook on Housing and Homelessness *Vermont House of Representatives Speaker Mitzi Johnson* 
  - a) Spoke about upcoming \$35 million housing bond a "mortgage" for affordable housing
    - i) \$2.5 million annual expense, \$1 million from VAHC budget
    - ii) Discussed how to consider replacement/alternative funds for \$1 million long-term
  - b) Noted outstanding issues: Domestic Violence, Opioid crisis, mental health struggles
  - c) Opened the floor to questions:
    - i) Discussed:
      - (1) Service component of ending homelessness
      - (2) Legislative workgroups
      - (3) Income tax
      - (4) "Newness" of House members (40% in first or second term)
      - (5) SASH
      - (6) Persons who are "blacklisted" from housing
- 3) Pro Tem's Perspective and Outlook on Housing and Homelessness Senate President Pro Tempore Tim Ashe
  - a) Comments about current federal policies, funding etc. (see handouts)
  - b) Identified healthcare as most important issue in Vermont
    - i) Ongoing increases in healthcare spendings (currently at \$6 billion/year)
    - ii) Decreases in non-healthcare spending (without saving the state \$)
  - c) Open the floor to questions:
    - i) Discusse:
      - (1) How to address shift in healthcare funding
      - (2) Moving Medicaid Medicaid payments to local mental health agencies
      - (3) Proposals for next year to be determined
- 4) Report from DC Kate Ash, Senator Leahy's Office
  - a) Comments re: ideological differences in Washington related to funding of social services
  - b) Senator active in defending against and advocating for best practices
  - c) Appropriations
    - Debt ceiling and continuing resolution passed last week and lasts through early December
    - ii) Debates outstanding re: raising budget caps
    - iii) Thus far housing and services have fared well
  - d) Please see handout
    - i) 2.5 billion increase to HUD (CDBG, HOME, rental increases, fair housing office protection, subsidies for persons who have experienced domestic violence)
    - ii) Continuing resolution is possible, omnibus possibility?
    - iii) Leahy's office staff touring sites in August
    - iv) Supporting HUD with Technical Assistance availability and timeliness of NOFA
    - v) Farm Bill that oversees USDA rural development (needs to be passed next year)

- 5) Report from DC Katarina Lisaius, Senator Sanders' Office
  - a) Budget Update:
    - i) Ranking member of Senate budget committee
    - ii) Proposed budget had many cuts
  - b) Comments re: healthcare including Medicare for all bill/ utilizing budget reconciliation process for tax reform
  - c) Comments re: national housing trust funds
- 6) Report from DC Susan Elliott, Congressperson Welch's Office
  - a) Conducted tour of social safety networks in Vermont (DV, Homeless prevention, service programs, food support program)
  - b) Believes in poverty relief programs
  - c) Homelessness has decreased nationally, but important to continue advocacy
- 7) Governor's Perspective and Outlook on Housing and Homelessness Governor Phil Scott
  - a) Comments re: \$35 million bond (highlight as opportunity for shared goals)
  - b) Referenced guiding principles: "strengthen economy, make Vermont more affordable, protect most vulnerable"
  - c) Identifies political polarization as greatest national threat strong working relationship with delegation and collaboration with legislature
  - d) Reassessing permitting process, freeing up housing stock (upgrades, etc.)
  - e) Opened the floor to questions:
    - i) Discussed:
      - (1) Pathways from Poverty Council no longer exists from executive order that expired after 3 years
      - (2) SASH support
      - (3) VHCB full funding
      - (4) Blueprint support
      - (5) Young families/youth staying in-state
      - (6) GA funds for families in shelters
      - (7) VHFA down payment assistance program through tax credit
      - (8) Small contractors purchasing/flipping single family homes
      - (9) Occupancy Tax depend on "status of economy, revenue sources, and what happens in Congress"
      - (10) Opioid epidemic
