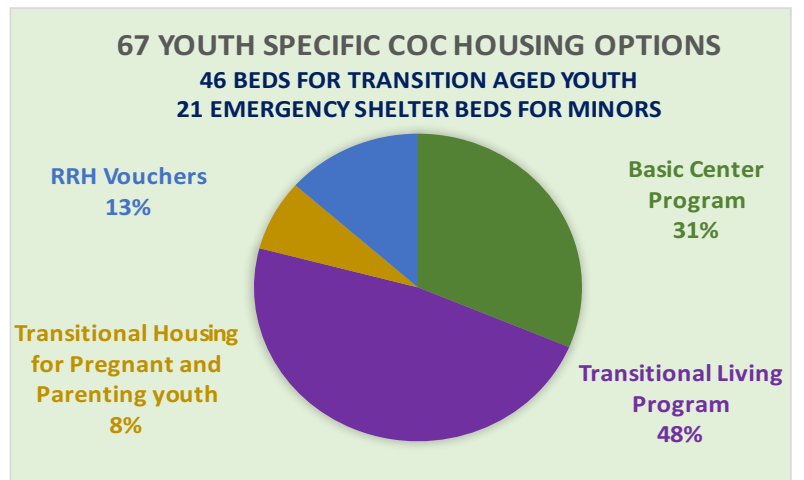
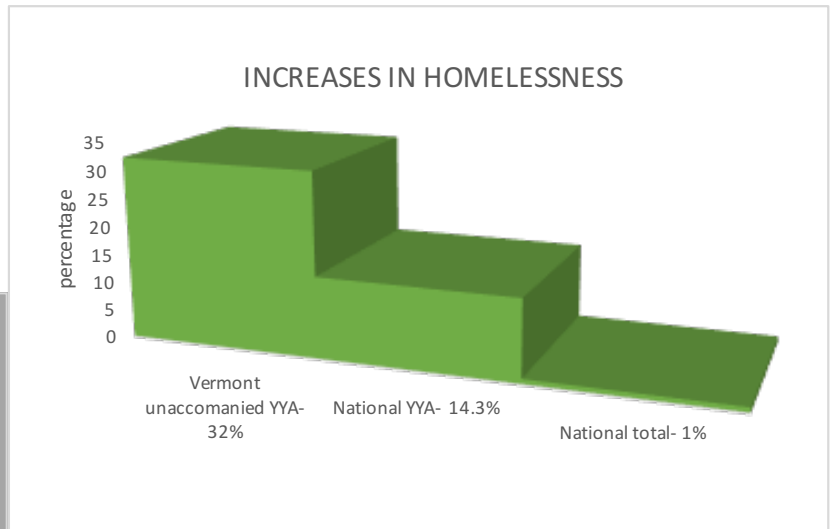
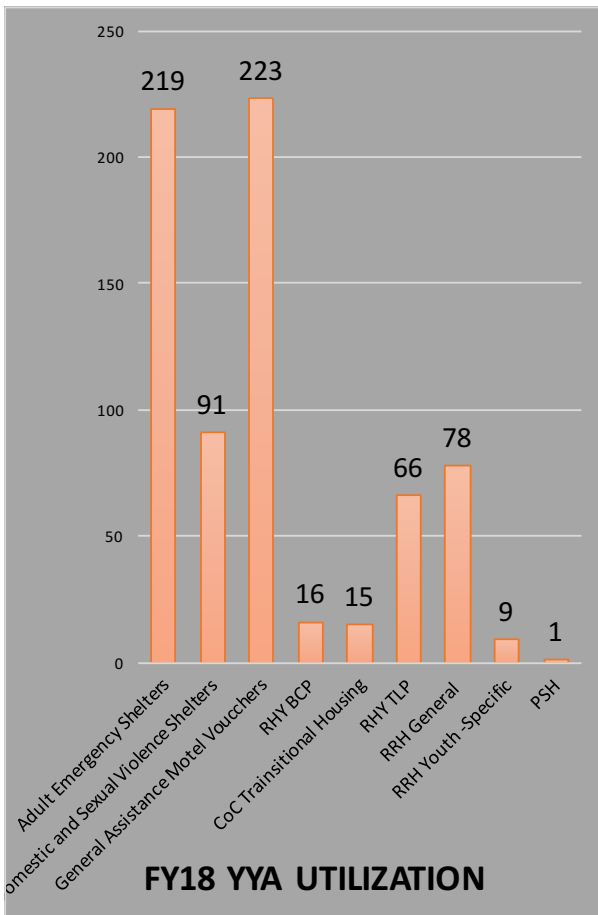


## Vermont Youth Homelessness Demonstration Program FY18 Data Highlights

**399 youth and young adults  
12-24 years old  
were sheltered and housed**



*Housing and shelter support is the top issue people ages 18-24 called VT 2-1-1 for, with over 900 calls in the past year*

**100** unaccompanied youth ages 12-24 were identified during the 2018 PIT count

- 61% were in emergency shelter
- 31% in transitional housing
- 8% unsheltered

**124** precariously housed youth were identified on the same night

## Who is seeking services?

- 22% of all youth receiving housing supports were parenting
- LGBTQ youth make up about 20% of all youth served by VCRHYP's RHY providers
- More than 1 in 4 of all YYA in HMIS identified as a survivor. Young adults aged 18-24 represented nearly 19% of all persons sheltered in Balance of State domestic and sexual violence shelters.
- 340 students in grades 6-12 were connected to McKinney-Vento Homelessness services, 6.2% were unaccompanied minors
- 51% of YYA are entering crisis beds from precarious housing, 18% are unsheltered before entry into a crisis bed
- Youth of color and from ethnic minorities seek services at a rate on par with their representation in the general population, but Black youth spend more time in emergency shelters, averaging 74 days versus 25 days for White counterparts

## Moving People into Housing through coordinated entry:

In November 2018, there were:

- 42 YYA who had been on the Master List for 90-180 days
- 18 who had been on for 181-270 days
- 10 who had been on for 271 days or longer

Only 7% of youth and young adults, on average, received a complex service needs score of 8-12 through the Coordinated Entry Assessment, which would allow them to be prioritized towards the top of the Master List. Despite the Master List's goal of connecting people with Permanent Supportive Housing and Rapid Re-housing programs, 0% of YYA exited to PSH and only 4% exited to RRH.
